Firstly, research what portfolios are and ensure you understand what universities will be looking for. Then create a portfolio of ideas that could be taken to interviews. These should be on A3 or A2 and represent a range of tasks such as:



- Mood boards
- Design pages with samples
- Research pages
- Working direct from observation pages

Build up your knowledge of contemporary and non-contemporary artists to help you in your Art Textiles work. It is not always about visiting big galleries, often smaller galleries will have some excellent exhibitions on. Make sure you keep up to date as they change exhibitions regularly.
