

Spotlight on SEND

SEMH – Social Emotional Mental Health, a need which creates barriers for some children and young people to access their learning or find enjoyment within school. Yet, with the right understanding and working collaboratively at home and school, children can break down these barriers and build on their emotional resilience which supports their academic achievement.

Social and Emotional skills are important life skills that help children and young people develop their resilience and manage their thoughts, feelings and behaviours. With these skills, young people can negotiate their way through challenging situations as well as building positive relationships with their peers and adults. However, some children will have many difficulties in managing their SEMH which is where our Learning Support Unit will step in and offer support.

Within our Learning Support Unit we have a key focus on understanding the social and emotional needs of our students and ensuring that we are offering many layers of support. This can include a multitude of interventions ranging from 1:1 mentoring, group sessions and the ability to offer external support if required. Our students enjoy their dedicated interventions which will adapt as they continue through the process of developing emotional resilience. So how can you support your child at home?

We understand how challenging it can be at home when your child is struggling to engage with learning or to access the support needed to build their emotional wellbeing. Therefore, we have a dedicated team of Pastoral Support Managers, an Education Welfare Officer and a Student Mentor who can offer support and refer to services when needed. Positive communication between school and home helps our young people to develop and grow through their challenges.

The first step is to shine a light on the challenges and teach appropriate strategies to manage emotions. There are many strategies that support SEMH, yet it is not a one size fits all. Consistency is vital to enable our young people to establish what is right for them and as their trusted adults adapt the strategies as they develop and grow.

Journaling has many benefits, some of these are:

- Identify and Track long/short term goals and personal development, supporting a vision of future self
- Improve self-awareness
- Process emotions and thoughts, supporting a development in growth mindset.



Creative Activities can have a calming and positive effect on children with SEMH. Having a space to explore their creativity allows a process of opening their thoughts and emotions. This can be done with simple steps such as colouring, drawing, painting, knitting or crochet. It is important to ensure your child knows that whatever they create is right for them, there is no right answer when it comes to their own creativity.

Talking Therapies and the power of feeling heard and understood can have the most helpful impact on your child's emotional resilience. We understand this is difficult with hectic busy lives but setting aside 10/15 minutes to talk with your child and listen can support a positive relationship and meet their needs to develop their emotional wellbeing.

Art Textiles

In October, Year 13 Art Textiles students went to London to visit two exhibitions that will help them with their Personal Investigation projects.



In the morning they headed to the Design Museum to see *REBEL: 30 Years of London Fashion*. This exhibition showcased the forefront of fashion over the last 30 years. The students focused on the techniques and styles of fashion that they saw. From Sam Smith's suit which they wore at the Brits through to recycled fashion of the future, the students took inspiration from what they saw.

In the afternoon, the group moved over to the Victoria and Albert Museum where they were treated to the interactive *DIVA exhibition*. DIVA celebrated the power and creativity of iconic performers, exploring and redefining the role of 'diva' and how this has been subverted or embraced over time across opera, stage, popular music, and film. The students were submerged into a musical interactive display. From Judy Garland to Adele to Lizzo, there were outfits that had been seen at the MET Gala and beyond.

The students enjoyed both exhibitions saying: "I liked the Rebel exhibitions, it has given me some really good ideas for my final piece."


Library news

Year 10 work experience

In September, Year 10 and 11 students were offered an opportunity to experience Pre-med Projects. Students attended 5 online sessions with real doctors to 'dig' deeper in medicine and give insight into what it is really like.

Attending the Pre-med Projects is a wonderful chance for me to be given an insight into what doing medicine could be like. By taking part in the weekly sessions we have learnt about work experience and many things that are involved with medicine. In these sessions we have learnt about how to look after a patient and help them and we have also looked at basic anatomy and also looking at medical scans. The doctors that run these sessions help teach us about real life scenarios and how we figure out what is causing them to be unwell and also how we can

then decide the course of treatment for the patient.

They also help us by telling us what they studied at A-level which were needed for them to be able to go to Medical school and what their experience was like and also tell us tips to help our learning. They were very understanding and kind with us and helped answer any questions we wanted to know. In short, I felt that the doctors were wonderful at helping us figure out if medicine could be for us and that taking part in these sessions they actively helped us understand about medicine. It was a very enlightening experience.

In these weekly sessions, I have learned about what work experience means and more medical knowledge. It has been really inspiring as I have talked with doctors and I am very grateful that they have taken time out of their day to teach us. I have learnt a lot about how to treat patients, what doctors do when they see a patient and about the anatomy of our body. One of the things I have learnt is that it is very important to ask a patient about their medical history as that would affect what doctors do. The patient's medical history and their family's history would affect their genes, therefore the patient's diagnosis and treatment. The doctors in the session were very patient with us even though we were such a large group. They would offer a Q&A session after every lesson, and not only answer medical related questions but would also give us studying tips. They also shared some of their own stories and would encourage us. Overall, I think these sessions are very inspiring and helpful to me. It has taught me lots of medical knowledge and how to care for a patient.

Year 13 Summer work experience

My work experience at Askews Legal LLP Law Firm in Coventry gave me an insight into the different services that they offer. I shadowed a solicitor who, as part of the Family law team, specialises in Divorce and Civil Partnership Dissolution. She explained that through the processes, the main aim is to find a fair financial settlement and suitable arrangements for children involved. During my time there I learnt the internal processes of divorce as well as an understanding of other elements to family law. I found my work experience with Askews to be extremely beneficial for me as I was able to gain an insight into the workings of a Law firm.

Annie Brown

My work experience was at the Marks and Spencer headquarters in London, where I shadowed a fashion buyer in men's footwear. I was able to get an insight into the working day of fashion-related jobs as I attended various meetings with the Head Buyer and Head of Design for the whole of M&S. I also had a zoom call with the Head Marketer. This helped guide me to find my career interest.

I also volunteered at the RSPCA charity shop on Earlsdon High Street, where I learned the behind-the-scenes experience of retail and the importance waste has on our environment.

I undertook 75 hours of work experience at Coopers Estate Agents, where I learned skills of conversing with clients, analytical skills, computing skills, and working in a professional environment.

I also completed two FutureLearn courses: Introduction to Studying Law and; Inside the U.K. Supreme Court.

As well as these, I visited Coventry Magistrates Court in September, where I observed a case on the production of a cannabis farm in Warwick.

I organised a law work experience placement in criminal defence law with the firm Wallace McNally. I visited Coventry Magistrates Court with the barristers to attend hearings and I wrote letters to defendants about updates on their cases. It gave me a really good insight into the profession I want to go into.

My work experience at Rolls Royce in Ansty cemented my passion for engineering and it helped confirm aerospace engineering as my course options for University. It gave me an insight into how the aviation industry works and revealed the true precision and attention to detail in manufacturing aeroplane parts.

I went to Rolls Royce in Ansty and got to work on the shop floor with industry professionals learning how they carry out quality control and how they put products together. I gained increased knowledge of engineering and what the industry has to offer from people who have had first-hand experience.

Work experience at Rolls Royce. It was interesting to see the practical side of engineering to get the feel of what it really looks like. To have the opportunity to learn from people with over 20 years experience was so useful.

Year 7 Update


Ms Maxwell, Head of Year 7

The Character Passport was also launched several weeks ago. This term students are aiming to achieve Bronze. This requires them to fulfil several criteria for Attendance, Achievement via Ace points, the Reading Award (this is directed by their English teacher), three tasks of their choice from the Super Curriculum, and some selected tasks from the booklet itself. The programme allows students to choose many of the tasks so that they can choose what the most appropriate path for them to take, whilst still fulfilling the necessary requirements. The deadline for submission for Bronze is 27 November.

Ms Maxwell, Head of Year 7




A massive well done to all of our students who have achieved a certificate for achieving over 25 Ace points or who have received an email or postcard home. We are very proud of you all.





Some are working with the SEND department whilst others are working on our Reading Programme with Year 7 students. Others are helping with sporting activities at break times.



Key Stage 3

- Year 7 students have been playing the What's my Line (Guess my Job) game with non-teaching staff as a way of introducing them to staff and importantly, learn about the variety of jobs people do.
- Year 7 will be introduced to JED (Job Explorer Database) our careers guidance programme which will help raise aspirations by showing many jobs they can aspire to, and where those jobs can lead.

Key Stage 4

- Careers guidance interviews are commencing with Year 11s.
- Students will receive an Action Plan to support their career decisions with advice how to move forward.
- Warwickshire College delivered a presentation to all Year 11 students in assembly.
- The Apprenticeship Service will be delivering a presentation to all Year 11 in December.
- Career Bite sessions are returning with invited speakers delivering short presentations to KS4 students during registration time.
- College open evenings have commenced for Year 11 students and it is important that students considering this pathway should visit the colleges they are interested in as soon as possible.
- Every 2 weeks a careers update is included in the school bulletin highlighting college and employer open events, apprenticeship opportunities and workshops.

Key Stage 5

- All year 12 and 13 students are emailed a careers update through the sixth form newsletter every two weeks highlighting live and virtual work experience opportunities, higher and degree apprenticeship events and invitations to career talks.
- The Apprenticeship Service will be delivering a workshop to Year 13 students on Degree Apprenticeships in November and will follow this up with a session on Employer Mock Assessments.
