

Product Design competition

Our Year 9 Product Design students have been taking part in a nationwide competition called *Design Ventura*. Run by the Design Museum in Kensington, London, students are challenged to design a product that would be suitable to be sold at the gift shop.

First, we investigated the Design Museum and the range of items sold at the gift shop. We considered the different groups of people who would visit the shop, including families and younger audiences, tourists and locals buying gifts.

After creating a range of designs individually, students then joined together as groups of 4 to 6 to decide on their final product, plan and present their 'pitch'. They had to explain how their design met the brief, the materials it would be made from and how sustainable the design was.

This year saw some excellent designs including:

"Car Wash" by Lily, Janelle, Helena, Nethu, Rebecca - a bath toy which encourages children to have a bath.

"Eco Plane" by Excellent, Kojo, Jayden, Simeon, Anay - a paper aeroplane kit that sows wildflower seeds to encourage children to plant more flowers.

"Box of Earth" by Exoucia, Vaiga, Jummy, Lynette, Joana - a kit that families could assemble together of different landmarks from different countries, educating children about the buildings and cities they are in.

"Fun Chain" by Ann-Marie, Yui, Ruth, Emily - a keychain of activities to guide children and families around the Design Museum, engaging them with the exhibits in an interactive way.

"Happy Grow" by Molly, Ruby, Lisa, Felicia, Kaitlyn - a kit which includes a bamboo plant pot with seeds to plant and a paintbrush, paint and stencils so families can decorate them together.

"Designo" by Jack, Grace, Liam, Mykhail - a Monopoly board of the Design Museum which features different classic items from different areas of design including transport, packaging and technology.


Only one design can be submitted to Design Ventura from each participating school. Miss Hully

The judges look through all entries and put together a shortlist of 10 schools from across the country. After a pitch event at the Design Museum in London, the final winning product will be manufactured and sold in

the Design Museum gift shop. All of the profits go to a charity chosen by the winning team. Good luck to our students!

Public speaking

This term, 15 of our Year 12 students took part in a Public Speaking workshop run by the Speakers Trust. They developed their confidence and skills, were all extremely positive throughout and gained so much from the experience. The day culminated in all 15 students giving a speech on a topic they felt strongly about. Topics spoken about included 'Social media is damaging to mental health', 'Is Britain great?' and 'Homework should be embraced as it is beneficial.' During the day we were also visited by Local MP Zara Sultana who helped with the difficult decision of choosing the top 5 speeches. These were given by: Daniel Murphy; Oliwia Kmak; Samantha Mulbah; Chelsey Bapaga and Melanie Nkundwa.

These 5 students will now go on to give their speech alongside other students from schools across the Midlands in a few weeks time. From here a handful will be selected to give their speech in the House of Commons. They all did the school proud, and we wish the five successful students the best of luck for the next stage.

In the courts

In January, our Year 13 sociology students visited the Coventry Magistrates Court. The



students went through an airport-style security check, and into one of the empty court rooms, where they were given a talk by a member of the Magistrates court.

They were told of the different types of cases that are dealt with, different roles with the court, the layout of the court rooms, changes in types of crime in recent years and the effects of the pandemic.

The students were then given the opportunity to view various court cases to get a real feel of the criminal justice system. Seeing the cases unfold was fascinating and hugely rewarding as there were many links made to the crime and deviance unit.





Mathematics rocks

Our mathematics department is incredibly excited to announce that we came 4th place out of 115 secondary schools in NSPCC Rocks - a times tables competition run by the internationally renowned, award-winning app and learning platform, Times Tables Rock Stars.

NSPCC Rocks required children to correctly answer as many multiplication and division questions as possible, to give their class and school the best chance of winning.

The competition was fierce with 64,226,178 questions answered collectively by 466,721 students from more than 2,993 schools and 60,370 classes around the country!

Our school stats were astonishing too. On average our top class answered 709 questions correctly per student, with the best performing student answering an amazing 4,078

questions correctly in total. I am sure you can appreciate that those stats are out of this world!

Holocaust memorial

Denzel Kira, Year 12, was invited by the National Race Network Board Committee to make a presentation, as a child of a survivor of the genocide against the Tutsi in Rwanda, on Holocaust Memorial Day.

Denzel said: "I was invited to present a talk by the DWP Faith and Belief Champion Support Team, Shafiq Mohammed, to speak to over 500 people virtually across the country about how it is being a child of a survivor of the genocide against the Tutsi. I was able to discuss the reality of what happened and how families are still trying to rebuild and move on, but not forget, to this day. I was honoured to be able to present this as I was able to educate many people from all ages and all backgrounds on the long lasting effects of such an atrocity.

"The responses back were so great, many being: 'I can't believe he is only 17' or one that I appreciated highly was that of 'Thank you Denzel, such an articulate and moving presentation' and another reading 'Thanks Denzel – your mother is truly a Queen to have dealt with so much. Truly inspirational'.

"These were so great to hear and I am really grateful to my mum for educating me and for the opportunity."

Drama



Our GCSE Drama students were treated to a live theatre performance in London's West End of a dramatic and terrifying production of *The Woman in Black*. This amazing production is closing after 35 years at the Fortune Theatre and, as always, had the students on the edge of their seats throughout.

In January, Year 9 Art groups took part in 'We Explore Drawing' workshops led by working artist Paul Brandford. He introduced the students to ideas about portraiture (their current theme in Art) using chalk, charcoal and collage. This was an excellent opportunity for students to adopt strategies of instinct and risk to improve both observation and visual language.

Coventry Schools Cup (Boys): Currently all boys' teams are still in the Coventry Schools Cup and will play their next fixtures after half term.

West Midlands Schools County Cup (Boys): The Year 8 boys have recently progressed into the quarter final of the competition after beating Windsor High School 7-1 in the previous round. They will now play Summerhill School in the next round.

West Midlands Schools County Cup (Girls): All our girls' teams are still in the competition. The Year 7/8 team had an impressive 8-1 victory over Sandwell in the last round and will now play Q3 Academy in the semi-final after half term. Year 8/9 team continued their defence of the trophy with an emphatic 11-0 win over St Michaels High School. They will now play either Sandwell Academy or Walsall Academy in the semi-final. The Year 10/11 girls are through to the semi-final and will play Phoenix Collegiate for a place in the final.

Art Textiles

In January 2023, 50 Art Textiles students from Years 9, 11 and 12 headed to the Tate Modern in London. This was an excellent opportunity for the students to experience contemporary artwork first hand and help them contextualise their own textile work in a modern forum. Students were able to see a range of work and were fascinated by the work of Cecelia Vicuna a textile installation artist who combined sculpture, sound, music and video. These large pieces dominated the Turbine Hall. They hung from the ceiling like large rainforest trees.



Students were free to explore the vast gallery and develop an understanding of what artwork they liked and disliked. Miss Newell said that it was a great day where several conversations about what art is? where art fits into the world and why people create art were had. The



students found it very useful and it is nice to see the influence of the trip in their sketchbooks and art textiles lessons.

A huge thank you to all of the staff who made this trip possible and to our driver from Ridley's coaches who gave us a free sight seeing tour of London on our way home.

We have been very fortunate to have some of our sixth formers giving up their spare time to help us in the Learning Support Unit. Several have chosen something that links with what they would like to do in the future. Orla and Aruna, who study Psychology, have run 'Confident Me' and 'I am Awesome' girls' groups, which are about raising self-esteem. Lego therapy is used to build

communication skills and Paige has been working with a group of Year 7 boys. Also Madeline is an aspiring speech and language therapist and has been doing some fantastic work with a Year 7 boy using resources provided by the NHS team. This year, a number of sixth formers have been involved in the catch-up reading scheme and one of our dyslexic students in our Sixth Form is mentoring a younger pupil. All of our students have taken their interventions very seriously and have made a real difference and setting a great example to others.


Year 7 Update



The Spring term for our Sixth Form has brought an exciting and busy start to 2023.


The New Year began with the Sixth Form mock examinations. Progress reports were sent home in February; if you have not received your child's report please contact a member of the Sixth Form team.

A presentation by the University of Warwick Finance Team introduced the students to how Student Finance England will process the funding for their degree and the loans available. Students will need to register with SFE in March 2023. Funding packs have been given to Year 13 students. Students were reminded to submit their application early to be sure that they budget wisely.

Year 13 students applying for Apprenticeships had the opportunity to discuss the different RAF pathways when one of their personnel came into school for a Career Bite session.

The Realising Opportunities Programme, an innovative national programme which introduces talented students to some of the country's leading research intensive universities, invited 10 Year 12 students to their launch event. Over the next year they will attend a structured, interactive programme that will help them to develop their academic skills.

Careers Update

Key Stage 3

- Job of the Week has started for Year 7 and 8 students and they will be watching short video clips on a variety of exciting occupations and discussing them with their tutor.
- Mrs Bellingham has delivered a careers session to all Year 9 students. Students have learnt how to use careers research to help them with their options choices and future career ideas by using icould.com and the school's careers guidance programme, JED. All students received details on how to access JED at home as well as at school.

Key Stage 4

- Individual careers guidance interviews are in progress with Year 11s.
- An apprenticeship workshop will be taking place shortly to offer support and guidance to Year 11 students who are applying for apprenticeships.
- Career Bite presentations have been delivered by the RAF on the variety of careers available and Rolls Royce launching their engineering apprenticeships at Ansty. All Year 11 students had the opportunity to attend these early morning sessions in the library.
- A regular careers update is included in the school bulletin highlighting college and employer open events, apprenticeship opportunities and workshops.
