

## Message from our Headteacher


This half term has felt incredibly short! With the additional bank holiday, some weeks have just flown by. It is still incredible how much we have packed in to five short weeks.

#### Warwickshire Schools Book Award



As reported in the last newsletter at Easter, our Library Book Club was rewarded back in March with a trip to the ceremony for the Warwickshire Schools Book Award. As well as meeting authors and hearing them speak

about their books, two of our students won prizes for creating visual or written pieces based on one of the shortlisted books. We shared a still image taken from Grace's category-winning animation, inspired by the WWII novel While the Storm Rages, written by Phil Earle. The book (based on



real events) tells the story of the government's request for people to euthanise their pets at the beginning of the war, and one boy's fight to save his beloved dog.

### Coventry Inspiration Book Award

As well as the Warwickshire Schools Book Awards mentioned above, our Book Club, along with two in-school reading groups, has also been following the Coventry Inspiration Book Awards. There are five different shortlists for the CIBAs, and we had students reading titles from the three that are suitable for secondary pupils (the other two are aimed at primary age). Our groups wrote reviews and voted for their favourites, and were very happy when the winners were announced.

The CIBA ceremony itself doesn't take place until the Summer term, and we are very excited to say that it looks like we will be hosting it! We will have staff and students from schools all over Coventry and as many of the five winning authors as the Schools Library Service can arrange to be there. We are hoping the day will offer similar chances as the WSBAs to meet the authors, have books and reading journals signed, and take photos.

### London trip

Thirty nine students across Years 7, 8 and 9 went on a



Geography trip to London in May. They visited the Natural History Museum and the BBC Earth Experience to expand their geographical knowledge and immersed themselves in our Earth's rich history and wonders.



## Weekly Library focus

### Autism Acceptance Week

The beginning of April was World Autism Acceptance week. This week, championed by the National Autistic Society, aims to raise the profile of Autistic Spectrum Condition (ASC) and help communities to be more inclusive of people with autism.

In our school there are around 40 students with ASC. Sensory differences can make it stressful for students to walk through busy corridors, cope with noise in classrooms or wear certain fabrics in uniform. Navigating the complex social side of school can also be challenging.

To take part in Autism Acceptance Week, Mr Virk's form, 7BV, gave an excellent presentation in assembly to the rest of the year group and many staff. These students spoke eloquently about the traits and differences of autism and delivered some interesting facts. They interviewed one of our sixth formers about his experiences at Bishop Ullathorne. This brilliant work by 7BV aimed to raise the profile of ASC in our school. Having knowledge of autism helps us to be attentive to the different needs of students in our school community and this was a great example to set by Year 7.

In school we encourage students to support their ASC peers in many ways, such as walking around calmly and quietly, maintaining a low noise level in classrooms and being compassionate towards others. We are thrilled about the success of several of our previous students and their progress at university and in employment.

Year 10 Product Designers have enjoyed lessons with the Dyson Engineering Box. Students disassembled the tangle-free turbine heads and anti-tangle screw heads to better understand how they work.





They completed a product analysis and user trip with the cordless V12 and discussed why different design decisions were

made. They considered what decisions were made to make it better for the customer or for the environment. It was an



excellent opportunity to learn about different careers at Dyson and the varied roles that are available within the engineering sector.



#### STEM Club

It has been a term full of many geologically important sessions in the club indeed.

This term, the students designed their own paper mâché volcano and saw these erupt as a result of chemical reaction, carefully monitored by our team of sixth form students. In another very interesting and tempting session they made three different kinds of rocks using a variety of CHOCOLATES.

Our STEM Club ran its final session just before half term.

In the final session, students made Rainbow Fizz using a variety of acids and alkalis which bought a very colourful and apt end to this year's sessions.



#### **Houses of Parliament**

In April, Year 12 students Chelsey Bapaga and Oliwia Kmak travelled to the Houses of Parliament in London to make their 'maiden speech' in front of a large audience including Coventry South MP Zara Sultana. The scheme was organised by the Speakers Trust with the support of our local MP as well as former Bishop Ullathorne student. Richard Walsh, of Cadent Gas.









### Animal Aid guest speaker

In English, our intention to develop eloquence through a love of the written and spoken word underpins each our units. Year 8 students are currently studying non-fiction writing and the art of spoken and written eloquence. As part of this unit, we have invited students to consider the topic of Animal Rights. This covers a range of topics from Intensive Farming and the Ethics of Zoos to Animal Testing and modern research methods. The aim of this unit is for students to spend time thinking about their own views and perspectives and to develop the skills needed to share their ideas and opinions with the right balance of conviction and compassion. They are also encouraged to remain attentive to the feelings and needs of their audience. A guest speaker from Animal Aid enabled students to consider topics such as animals in sport, the fur trade, veganism and environmental impacts. Students were invited to ask as many questions as they liked in order to broaden their understanding of each topic and gave students the opportunity to take ideas back into the classroom to strengthen their own perspectives.

### Catering

Year 9 students attended an after school club to learn how to cook healthy Chinese meals. They learned how to make steamed dumplings, beef and broccoli and egg fried rice.

In the final session, students had some fun in a chopstick competition where they worked in pairs to pass 20 mini marshmallows between two plates; the quickest pair was Dimitra and Felicia - Well done to all who attended.









## Catering Academy

### Geography

In March, Year 12 geographers visited North Wales to collect data, and stayed in the familiar setting of Dol-y-Moch. The unusually cold March weather led to tricky conditions on the beaches of Criccieth and Harlech but the Geographers battled through to display excellent resilience and team work skills to collect data to count towards their A level examinations. Some even managed to sample ice creams in a bid to prove that they were on holiday! In the evenings, students worked really hard on follow up work but then relaxed with campfires, netball and basketball games. The students were a credit to the school.









### Chemistry

The Royal Society of Chemistry (RSC) invited students to participate in the 55th annual Chemistry Olympiad. Round one took place in January, with 11,838 students from 950 schools taking part – a new record for both. Bronze, Silver and Gold awards were up for grabs and 72% of the students who took part received awards, again outperforming last year's results.





The topics covered in the

2023 paper included rocket fuels, electronegativity, amino acid complexes, vaping and cheese. Electronegativity is a timely topic as last year was the 90th anniversary of Linus Pauling proposing the concept of electronegativity. With the 2023 Chemistry Olympiad being held in Switzerland, a question on cheese was obligatory. Students on the conversion of lactose to lactic acid during fermentation in cheese manufacturing.

Bishop Ullathorne A level Chemistry students utilised their own independent study time in order to prepare for this national competition and were a credit to themselves and the school with Arjun Raval, Riya Raval and David Ogaji achieving the silver award. Bartosz Zygowski, Benedict Burch, Ebenuella Agyemang and Jindjot Singh achieved the bronze award. A special mention to Fabian Jalowiecki who participated despite only having studied A level Chemistry since September 2022! Mrs Clinton-Lees was very proud of all our students and the hard work



they have shown in competing in this prestigious competition.

### UK Junior mathematics challenge

100 of our Year 7 and 8 students competed in the UK Junior Maths challenge this year. 8 students were awarded the silver certificate and a further 28 achieved bronze. Congratulations to all who took part and a special mention to Finley O'Reilly and Kai

Chen who were top of their year groups.

#### Ambassador masterclass

In conjunction with the Tree Council, five of our Junior Ambassadors took part in a 'Stories in Nature' masterclass. The hour long workshop was led by a talented writer and freelance author Harry Munt. He shared techniques to capture the wonder of nature within writing. Activities focused on the art of creating powerful fictional characters. Students will spend time completing their stories before submitting them for feedback from Harry.

### Sunflower competition

As part of our Year 8 Non-Fiction writing unit, students are putting their research into action and growing a competition winning sunflower. The aim is to plant and nurture from an initial seed right through to the harvest of their own seeds. The competition will run for the duration of the Summer term and prizes will be awarded for the tallest sunflower and the sunflower which produces the most seeds. Learning about plants; growing them from seed and appreciating the importance of plants in the environment is very important. As an Outstanding Eco School, it is important for our students to learn to respect plants and understand why we need them. We feel it is fundamental to encourage young people to look after our flora and the wildlife they support. Students should aim to grow their seed organically and without the use of any chemicals.

The competition is therefore secondary to the learning experience but is designed to put theory into practice and add an element of fun. It is hoped that students enjoy being involved.

Sunflower pots, a compressed soil disc and a sunflower seed will be coming home with students. If space is particularly tight at home, students are welcome to bring them into school once they have germinated and are strong enough to survive outside. It will remain the student's responsibility to tend to their sunflower where necessary.

We are very excited about our school trip to France in July with Year 8 and the Drayton Manor trip at the end of the Summer term.



#### **Public examination reminder:**

The public examination season commenced on Monday 15 May 2023 for our Year 11 and Year 13 students. All students were issued with their Statement of Entry and timetables with room and seat allocations.

With this in mind, we would like to remind students of the importance of full attendance during the examination period. All examinations start at 9am and 1pm and students must be in school and ready to go in to the examination room at least 10 minutes before these times. Coming to examinations late causes unnecessary anxiety and means that students miss vital instructions and information regarding the examination they are sitting.

All students need to bring their own equipment to every examination. This should include a black biro (not gel pens), pencils, ruler, geometry set (not in a tin) and a calculator (without the lid). This equipment should be in a clear, non-coloured, pencil case.

Water bottles must be see through, without any colour or patterns, and contain water only.

Mobile phones and wrist watches of any description are not allowed in the examination room.

Mrs Casey, Head of Sixth Form



Through their hard work, they have many different future apprenticeship and degree pathways to look forward to.

Our new Sixth Form Leadership Team has been appointed following 17 applications: 7 students were interviewed for the role of School Captain. Sydney Mosely and Megan Honey were delighted to accept the post and have an excellent team which will work alongside them.

This term, Year 12 students are developing their enrichment experiences and researching work experience opportunities. ## Medical appointments
