Reading challenge

group of keen readers in Year 7 were presented with certificates in assembly this term to celebrate their literary achievements. The first 24 students to complete the initial stage in our new Reading Challenge had all amazingly met the nine reading-related challenges in less than two months. The Bronze Reading Award tasks involve reading a recipe, poems and instructions for a game. Parents are asked to verify what had been read.

All of our 24 Bronze Reading Award winners were then entered into a prize draw to receive a book token. Four lucky students were selected at random. These students have now moved on to tackle the Silver Reading Award, which is even more challenging. It requires students to deliver a short presentation in their English class about what they have read and apply their reading to real life.

The second group of bronze readers was presented with certificates this month. It is hoped that all Year 7 students will complete the bronze challenges and some will even be devouring books for the prestigious Gold Reading Award.

Joanna Finch said: "Books allow you to leave everyone and discover new characters and places. Everyone should read. Reading lets your imagination be free. It also helps you to express yourself."

Fabian Jalowiecki said: "It takes you into crazy worlds full of detailed events and settings. My favourite writer produces amazing books. They make an impact on your life and there are jokes and puns there too. If boys are not reading, they are

The Book People are also now back in school on a monthly basis. A percentage of sales is donated by the company to school for us to spend on books and replenish stocks.

ur school library is currently undergoing a complete transformation. Painted, carpeted and with new seating, lighting and displays, the area will be completely refurbished. The intention is to provide a welcoming location for study which also supports a genuine love of reading. Opening the doors after Easter, our new librarian will encourage classes to make use of the space for curriculum based research, launch a range of competitions and enable all students to access engaging reading material.

Christopher Billings, Headteacher, said: "It is crucial that our library is at the core of our school. The thorough refurbishment will ensure that it reflects our whole school ethos of searching for excellence and fostering the development of our true self."

World Book Day

o celebrate World Book Day this year, our key stage 3 students explored how writers present empowering messages through poetry before attempting to write their own influential poems. They also looked at oral storytelling and focused on how to use intonation and gesture to convey meaning. Presenting their favourite stories, using a range of props, provided entertaining results!

Students were also encouraged to take part in a Short and Tweet competition. Alexandra Pintea (Year 8) was the winner. Using a poem for stimulus, she wrote: "It started with a goodbye, ended with a hello."

Books buzzing

Wo Year 7 classes have caught the reading bug. Both classes have been challenged to read and engage with as many books as possible from a list selected by contemporary critics. So far, students in 7A and 7X have read nearly 200 books between them. Anima Rahman, Byron Wilson and Nieel Parmar (7X) have read six books each. From 7A, Darcy Mills and Noah Agakiza have also read six books each while Vitalis Bechinze and Angela Mathimannarajah have read an incredible 11 and 13 books, respectively. Part of the Book Buzz initiative, each book is highly acclaimed.

Simon Ward, Teacher of English, said: "The students have gained a great deal of pleasure from opening up a brand new book. My group has been openly recommending books to each other and enjoying the discovery of new worlds. The sense of joy as they immerse themselves in the plot is almost tangible. There is nothing better."

Shannon Ryan said: "I enjoyed talking to the Careers' Advisers and learning about online courses which will help me with my future education."





Our Year 10 Careers'

Evening, organised by our Careers' Adviser, Wendy Bellingham, provided information about colleges, apprenticeships and our own school sixth form. Jane Horrocks, Careers' Adviser for Coventry College, spoke about college entry levels and grade

requirements for courses.
She also advised about the pros and cons of this pathway. An ambassador from the National Apprenticeship Service provided similar information about apprenticeships and Patricia Casey, Head of Sixth Form, gave an alternative perspective.



During the speeches, information was provided about last year's students and their destinations. Our Careers' Adviser also gave clear information about how and when she is able to support students with impartial guidance at school.



Boys' revision sessions

ur successful revision sessions for invited Year 11 boys have continued. The third round is currently being held. The quiet study periods after school have provided a focused time and place for revision without any distractions. Over a period of two weeks, the boys stay at school until 7pm on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Before each two-hour session, they are given food. During the study periods, the boys are encouraged to work independently using a range of revision techniques.

Cian Mulchinock, Year 11, said: "The sessions are excellent. If I was at home, I may be distracted to do other things. It is very focused and calm. I am grateful to the teachers for giving up their time to supervise."

Our students were fantastic ambassadors for our school. As you would expect, they contributed well to the discussions, got to know students from other schools and engaged with the speakers during their breaks."

Robotics club

S tudents from our Lego Robotics Club worked effectively as a team to impress the judges in a Midlands-wide competition at Warwick Trident College this term.

Winning the Robot Design Challenge elements of the overall competition, they overcame a variety of obstacles. In the teamwork challenge, judges commented that our students collaborated highly effectively. Under timed conditions, they completed a team activity which involved building a solution to a new task using Lego. Despite initial problems with the robots,



they worked well together as engineers to complete the tasks robotically by measuring distances and angles and translating this to computer code.

Students had previously built a robot out of Lego and programmed it to complete tasks based on the theme of Royal Air Force Humanitarian Aid. On the day, the robot was able to complete a speed test, assemble parts for an aeroplane and collect food parcels without any human intervention. The team also delivered a PowerPoint presentation to visiting judges about how robots could be useful in the future and how they worked together to solve



problems. Aniela Kesler (Year 7) was singled out for praise for her professional presentation.

James Bean, Teacher of Science, said: "I am very proud of our students' achievements. They overcame difficulties efficiently and collaboratively and their approach to tasks was very professional."

Power to the people

Sixty of our Year 8 students spent a day at Coventry University this month exploring how technology could enhance our lives.

In unison with DELL, the university's Powering Transformation Day encouraged students to take a fresh look at the role of technology in society. Students worked in groups to create and present an idea about how to improve a social issue in our world today. Ideas ranged from supporting teenage



depression, helping people with disabilities and online security. They also had a tour of the campus and sampled some of the latest DELL technology.



The winning team designed a robotic arm to support people who had lost limbs. Andrew Clifton, Harry Davies, Georgina Day, Alvin Kityo, Filip Krause and Mia-Jane Hallinan will now be entered into the regional final.


Our Year 8 boys and girls were also successful. Both won their indoor athletics competitions and will now represent West Coventry at the Coventry and Warwickshire schools' finals.





Fit for a princess


wo students

The next fieldwork will be carried out closer to home. Students will take the train to the centre of Birmingham where they will assess the regeneration which has taken place there. Visits to the Bullring, Brindley Place, the Mailbox and the new Birmingham Library are planned.
