Thinking about recycled materials, price, quality, logistics and marketing, the students enjoyed taking part in the challenging eco-designer competition. They presented their products to a judging panel made up of IKEA managers. The winning product was a sofa made from recycled material with storage compartments as well as chargers and lighting.

Lani Danes, former Bishop Ullathorne student and Marketing Specialist, said: "This was a great way to connect with the local community and to teach current students about IKEA's social responsibility as well as involving co-workers in a great activity."

Olivia Colleran, part of the winning student team, said: "This was an excellent practical experience. We collaborated brilliantly in groups to apply everything which we had learned during the tour. Justifying our designs to a panel of experienced judges was a real challenge and I am happy that our product, a recycled sofa, won."



#### **Festival of science**

Scientists from Year 7 to Year 10 attended an exciting festival of scientific ideas and discovery in London this term. At the New Scientist Live event, students saw live shows, took part in hands-on exhibitions and attended talks on scientific advances. Facilitated by the University of Warwick's outreach department, it allowed students to witness science coming to life.

Benjamin Cooper, Year 8, said: "The event was a great experience. As we entered, we were greeted by an array of amazing pieces of technology. There were stalls about the environment, drones and how our earth is changing. There was even an astronaut there to talk about her experiences and what it was like in space.

Part of a Smallpeice Trust STEM Day, the interactive workshop was intended to show students some of the practical applications of science. Jackie Dines, Head of Science, said: "Designed to complement the national curriculum in science, technology and mathematics, the day continued to enhance our students' understanding and aptitude for problem-solving, creativity, design and engineering."

during October half term, she was determined to
keep going and do her best against all odds. She lost
in the first round against the eventual winner, from
Croatia, then narrowly missed out on third place in
the repechage.

Now that Karate has been recognised as an Olympic sport, Niamh has her sights set firmly on the Great Britain team for the 2024 games. She has already faced competitors from all around the world and experienced the intensity of fighting in front of thousands of competitors.

She said: "The atmosphere in the stadium was amazing. Everyone was cheering and it was deafening. It is my ambition now to combine academic study with training for the sport which I love."

Diminutive Mia Stokes is currently unbeaten in all karate competitions and last month competed in the National Championships at the Alan Higgs Centre in Coventry. At only 5 feet and 1 inch tall, she beat other females in her



category to become the English Karate Champion for her height category.

Mia was initially introduced to the sport by her godfather. Now her whole family attend fights and cheer her on vociferously.

She said: "I want to be the best that I can and eventually fight for England. I am really fortunate that sometimes up to twenty members of my family come to cheer me on and they can make lots of noise. My mum is very encouraging although she can also be quite nervous."








#### He's behind you




#### Want to talk?

To achieve the Bronze Award, students will need to have achieved over 70 Ace Points, have attendance above 97 per cent and have achieved the Bronze Reading Award. They will also be expected to participate in at least two community events and have evidenced this using the pro forma in the booklet. The Silver and Gold Awards require a greater level of engagement in an extra curricular activity which can be in school or outside.

## **Hairspray hopefuls**



## **Welcome to Father Stephen**

ur new school chaplain, Father Stephen Day, joined us this term. He has been involved extensively in the school with weekly masses and reflections. Also, as part of our spiritual preparation for Advent, he led our penitential services for all of our key stage 3 students. He was joined by four other priests from the deanery who heard confessions throughout the day.

Here Father Stephen answers questions posed by members of the chaplaincy team.



## What was your first reaction when you were asked to be our chaplain?

It was a bit like picking up where I had left off — I had been a secondary school chaplain in my last parish for 14 years — but it is always a little bit daunting starting in a new place with new people. That is also exciting too and it has been good slowly getting to know some of the staff and pupils. There are still many I have not met and parts of the school I have not seen! Bishop Ullathorne has a good reputation and it is a privilege to be part of that.

## Have you any previous experience of chaplaincy in a secondary school?

Catholic secondary schools have been a large part of my priesthood. I am a qualified RE teacher and taught for six years both before and after I became a priest. I was a secondary school governor for 13 years, a chaplain for 15 and spent 10 years as a part time tutor on an RE teacher training course in Birmingham. I have been involved in secondary education in a variety of ways!

#### How do you see the role of chaplaincy with us?

The chaplaincy is not just me. The religious and pastoral life of a school is too big and should be too good for one person to run it all. The priest in school is there to provide the sacraments, of course, but not only that. He is a visible reminder of the school's Catholic character and ethos and is a support and encouragement to all who are part of it. He is there to walk with everyone on their Christian journey, however far along it they are - or are not. A lot of that is simply being around and being available.

#### Can you tell us a little bit about your background?

I was born in Oxford and my parents still live in Oxfordshire. I read theology at Oxford University. I became a Catholic in 1994 after being a minister in the Church of England, working in the Black Country on the other side of Birmingham. I qualified as a secondary school RE teacher and taught in the Catholic secondary school in Nuneaton for six years, both before and after I became a priest. My ordination was in 1998. I arrived at St Thomas More parish straight after Christmas 2014. I enjoy modern history (I nearly taught history but that is another story), old films, music and France.

## When did you become aware that you had a vocation to priesthood?

It did not come to me as a sudden discovery. Things people had said and things that had happened to me made a voice inside me start suggesting that being a priest was what God wanted me to be.

## What are the advantages of being a married priest with a family?

The house is rarely empty and there is usually someone to talk to and we share the chores. Lots of people have demanding jobs, work unusual hours or get called out at odd times.

#### Are you looking forward to Christmas?

Bishop Ullathorne is a friendly place with happy people who work hard. I have felt very welcome and I have loved working here during our preparations for Christmas. It is busy and hard work beforehand, lovely when it happens and beautifully quiet once the last Mass of Christmas is over. Yes - Merry Christmas to you all!

#### **Year 11 Skills Day**

ear 11 students were due to experience a taste of sixth form studies this month but this was postponed due to snow. Re-arranged for next term, over 100 students will experience four sessions.
