#### **Month of Mission**


s part of the special month of Mission, Bishop Ullathorne staff and students particularly focused on reaching out to support refugees in October.

Liturgical inset for our key stage 3 musicians was also organised with Dan Callow during October. This was followed by singing practice for the whole school to support our Masses for All Saints.





#### **Canonisation**

Il students were given a chocolate bar this term to celebrate the canonisation of St John Henry Newman, the first non-martyred English person to be made a Saint in 500 years. The 19th Century scholar led a movement to link



the Anglican Church with its Catholic roots.

However, his own conversion to Roman Catholicism was controversial. Despite this, he responded to his vocation: "God has called me to some definite service that he has not given to another." These words are reinforced in our school prayer.

o raise the profile of Bishop William Ullathorne (1806 to 1889) in school, all prayers are now ended with:

**Tim Lee-Mohan**, Head of RE, said: "We do this because there is a community of believers in Heaven (recognised Saints and others, including loved ones who have passed away) who can also intercede (pray for us) for God's blessings in our life, just as we might pray for those around us."

Our Year 7 students have finished their introductory topic in RE which explores Bishop Ullathorne's life as a sailor, his conversion to Catholicism in Latvia, his ordination as a Benedictine Monk and Priest, his work in Australia and voice in the abolition of transportation, his ground-breaking work in Coventry and his appointment as the first Catholic Bishop of Birmingham. Some of our Year 10 students have also been supporting their studies by recording views around school about what it is to be faith-filled and prophetic.

She said: "This is the best school I have ever been at. There are lots of opportunities for support and reflection throughout the day. My Form Tutor is also excellent and always gives us his time. The waiting list for this school is very long so I feel lucky to be here."

# Trip to the trenches

n September, 45 Year 11 students embarked on a mission to discover what life for soldiers was like during the Great War. It was an incredibly moving experience and allowed our students to grasp the enormity of the First World War.



Hanny Barry said: "We were taken to a number of museums where we were able to walk through trenches. As World War One is a topic I have been taught in History, I am glad that I was able to go on the trip to Ypres. It helped me gain a deeper understanding of the events and what it was like to live through them."

Visiting the Menin Gate, amongst other monuments, really put into perspective the amount of people who sacrificed themselves for the cause of war. Finding people with our surnames made it feel a lot more personal and a much more vivid experience."



athletes. She teaches primary age
children twice a week before
starting her own training in
Baginton and delivers a session at



Manor Park Primary School every Wednesday.

During a short weekend in Luxembourg she gained a bronze medal in a knockout competition and, in Berlin, she again gained the bronze in her own category and silver medal as part of a team of three. In the World Karate Championships in Chile, she represented the English national team for the second time. Travelling with the team on an athlete-only flight and staying in a hotel with only her team mates was an incredible experience. She was able to visit the Chilean Olympic stadium and see fencing and weighligfting Olympians as well as competitors from hundreds of countries. Despite losing to the current European champion, she was not happy about returning from Chile without a medal.

Niamh said: "I am a terrible loser. However, it was a really good fight and both of us were scoring quickly in a very intense competition. Karate is a disciplined sport, which requires ultimate concentration. It provides routine and focus in other areas of life."

# **Sixth Form Open Evening**

Here is what our Sixth Form students said about studying at Bishop Ullathorne.

Isabella Monsanto (Year 12) said: "Before transitioning into Sixth Form I was nervous to take on both an increased workload and greater responsibility for my own



education. Fortunately the Sixth Form team guided me, helping me to learn how to manage the pressures of A Level study whilst setting my own independent work. They further assisted me to expand the breadth of knowledge required for higher education by involving me in the HE+ programme run by the University of Cambridge. This equipped me with the skills and support with which to deepen my academic proficiency."

Mateusz Furtak (Year 12) said: In October, I successfully applied for a place on the Pathway to Banking and Finance. The programme is facilitated by the University of



Warwick and will give me a real insight into the financial sector of banking. This pathway provides great work experience opportunities such as being a shadow worker at a high street bank, solving workforce related problems and managing people. This pathway will sustain me with more knowledge and experiences that will help me with my university studies in 2021 when I will hopefully be studying accountancy and finance at the University of Warwick."

Manjot Chhokar (Year 12) said:

"My transition into A Levels has not been simple, yet with the guidance and support from my teachers it has allowed me to adapt to the



increased workload. The Sixth Form team has encouraged me to benefit from new opportunities like the Pathways to Law programme which will widen experiences for a career in Law."


Jessica Burch (Year 13) said: "I am very excited to study Geography at university and I received all five offers. At the moment, my ambition is to go to the University
