ow that the entire library stock has been re-catalogued, with help from the School Library Service, work is continuing to update the range of books available. 

Key stage 3 students also visited a Light and Laser workshop at the planetarium in Bristol for seasonal stargazing in 3D.



In addition, a team of students entered the Royal Society of Chemistry's Top of the Bench competition. Harry Davies and Mia-Jane Hallinan (Year 9), Lorcan Lenehan (Year 10) and Isabella Monsanto (Year 11) were placed 8th out of the twenty schools which entered.



Drama developments

The term has got off to a blistering start for the Drama department. Year 8 students have been solving the murder of Simon Peters in their murder mystery work and are proving to be excellent problem solvers through their detective role play. Stagecraft and Naturalism is being studied in Year 7 and key stage 4 students have embarked on their GCSE journey. Rosie McAlpine (Year 12) and Harry Davies (Year 9) have been leading our extra curricular Drama Club, which already has 68 members, and auditions for our school production have been held. Hoods will be staged in March.

Auschwitz

istory experts, **Denise Durkan** and **Jonathan Griffiths**, took 21 year 11 students to Krakow,
Poland. Here is their review of the experience.

"When you hear the word Auschwitz, you might think of films such as *The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas* or *Schindler's List*. In the classroom too, we talk about the gradual dehumanisation of the Jews and their subsequent destruction at the hand of the Nazis. We try to evoke the emotions of the Jewish people in the camps, their pain and suffering and their spirit to survive. However, nothing can bring it home more than visiting a camp and listening to a survivor.

"We were given a guided tour of the Jewish quarter, of Auschwitz-Birkenau, Schindler's museum and finally, and possibly most powerfully, met with an Auschwitz survivor called Lydia. She proudly told her story, showed us her tattoo and explained the experiments that Mengele performed on her and other children in the camp."











Lewis McCann said: "You can read about it in textbooks and watch films but nothing can prepare you for walking through the very place where 1.1 million people were held captive, tortured, killed and thrown away like paper. The hardest part of the tour for me was standing in the gas chamber and seeing first-hand the panic and hell etched into the walls from the prisoners trying to dig their way out with their bare hands, despite knowing that it was never going to work."

Aisleen Nelan said: "It can be difficult to empathise with people when all you are shown is a number. However, visiting Auschwitz made the terrors of the holocaust come to life. Although this is a melancholy thing to witness, it is important to learn about what has happened in the past so that our generation can stop history from repeating itself. I am extremely privileged to have heard Lydia's story; a story that I will never forget."

Maggie Keane said "We were able to immerse ourselves in another country's culture, history and architecture and also pay our respects to those lost in the Holocaust. Seeing the remains of Auschwitz and picturing the agony that so many people endured was truly unimaginable. The trip was brilliant. It was also difficult and tough at several times. Seeing, with my own eyes, the consequences of human evil was staggering."

Next year, a trip to the trenches is planned. This will span the English and History curriculum and cover life in the trenches, medicine during World War 1 and war poetry.



combine intensive training sessions with a small amount of sightseeing and relaxing on the island's beautiful





beaches. Yasmin is planning a break from competitions next year to focus on her final A level examinations.
